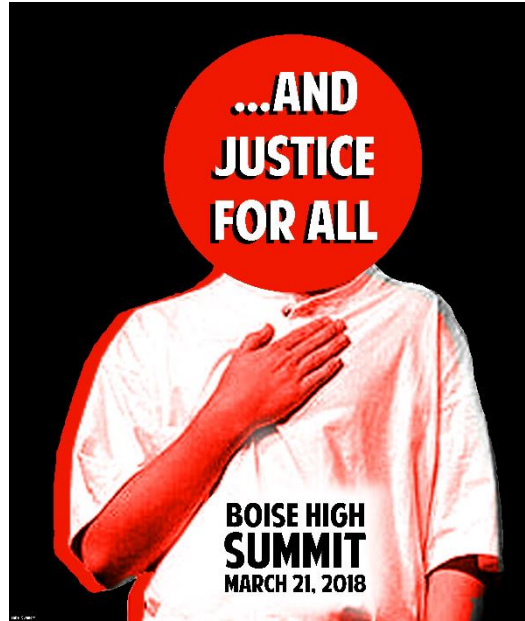


Welcome to Boise High's Student Summit!

History of the Boise High Summit

Boise High School has hosted student-led, project-based Summits for the past four years, allowing students to engage one another on themes selected by the student body, and on topics into which each presenter has done extensive research. Organized by the students of AVID 11, the Summit allows students to be the teachers, spreading ideas and expertise on issues that ignite their passion and curiosity. The first Summit was in 2015, where we explored food in the Fall and Wellness in the Spring. Our 2016 Summit, "The Sustainability Summit," looked at how we can be sustainable in a variety of ways. Last year the "Be the Change" Summit encouraged students to own their power as change-makers in our community. This year will be our fifth annual Summit, themed "...and Justice for All." Through their knowledge, passion, and community, Boise High students make the world a more just place to live.



Keynote Speaker

This year, Boise High students selected BHS alumna and state Senator Cherie Buckner-Webb as their keynote speaker. First elected to the Idaho House in 2010, Cherie is Idaho's first African-American legislator and is well-known among her constituents and colleagues alike for her willingness to break down barriers. In a similar fashion, she has also held true to her convictions, fighting day-in and day-out on behalf of ordinary Idahoans. She has been a powerful and consistent advocate for the environment and public health. Cherie's mantra is "leave a legacy," and in four years of public office, she has done just that. Cherie continues to be a tireless advocate on behalf of Idaho's public schools.
